Status Update
September 1, 2020

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Overview of Executive Directive 2019-16

On September 17, 2019, Governor Gretchen Whitmer issued Executive Directive (ED) 2019-16, charging the state of Michigan to improve recycling rates and reduce waste levels.

The governor has challenged the state to lead by example and redouble its efforts to develop and implement effective recycling and waste management practices in state facilities.

The Department of Technology, Management & Budget (DTMB) is responsible for coordinating agency participation and reporting progress on the state's recycling efforts. DTMB will ensure each agency and department has all information necessary to comply with ED 2019-16 and participate in the state's recycling initiatives.

Each state agency will provide DTMB with the following information every six months:

- Number of nonexempt facilities offering recycling services.
- Number of facilities nonexempt.
- Percentage of its facilities offering recycling services.
- Pounds of disposed materials.
- Pounds of materials recycled at each facility to the extent practical.
- Requests for exemptions of buildings unable to provide recycling services.
- Recycling credits received from vendors.
- Recommendations for improving or expanding recycling in facilities.

DTMB, in conjunction with the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), reviews the state's recycling measures and creates strategies and procedures to improve the program. This includes developing educational resources to engage state employees on recycling services and best practices.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 27,000 state employees began working from home on March 16, 2020, which has limited recycling expansion efforts and pilot programs. The minimal occupancy in state facilities impedes the ability to provide reliable weights and measurements on recycling, trash removal weights, and composting pilot program updates. Additionally, engagement and training communications have been suspended. Once state employees substantially reoccupy buildings, all efforts will resume.

Implementation Measures

Liaisons

In November 2019, each state agency designated a liaison to ensure compliance with ED 2019-16. Agency liaisons are responsible for managing recycling inventory and metrics for facilities in their portfolio and reporting recycling progress and results for their agency. Agency liaisons work with their leadership to increase recycling services and recommend program improvements.

Resources for Tracking and Reporting

DTMB created the following resources for tracking and reporting recycling initiatives:

- **Recycling inventory sheets** are specific to each agency and list all facilities in their portfolio. This sheet identifies the facilities that have recycling services, the facilities that do not have recycling services, and the facilities that are exempt from establishing recycling services. The recycling inventory sheet may be revised on an ongoing basis.
- The **recycling toolkit** provides agencies with an overview of expectations and serves as an instructional tool for recycling liaisons. The toolkit provides:
 - Step-by-step instructions on how to populate forms and templates.
 - Details on how to procure recycling services.
 - A timeline with due dates for each part of the reporting process.
 - Contact information for recycling contract inquiries regarding leased facility concerns and general support.
- A **recycling reporting template** tracks metrics on waste and recycling and allows for recommendations on how to improve recycling practices.
- An **exemption form**, which contains the criteria used to request an exemption from establishing recycling services.

DTMB shared all resources with state agency leadership via email in November 2019 and followed up with another message to each recycling liaison upon notification of their appointment.

State Agency Recycling SharePoint Site

DTMB created a State Agency Recycling SharePoint site to house agency reporting documents and templates, a copy of ED 2019-16, and a contact list of agency liaisons. State agency liaisons can use this SharePoint site to share information applicable to the directive. DTMB can also post all final report drafts on this site.

ED 2019-16 Compliance Training

In early January 2020, DTMB invited each state agency recycling liaison to attend an ED 2019-16 training session. DTMB demonstrated how agencies can navigate through the State Agency Recycling SharePoint site. An overview was provided on the toolkit, reporting templates, and exemption form, followed by an open discussion to answer questions.

Recycling and Rubbish Removal Services

Recycling programs are structured at the discretion of each agency. Variables that influence recycling programs include:

- Building type
- Function
- Size
- Location
- Tenants
- Budget
- Security concerns
- Occupancy level due to COVID-19

Recycling services are available through the statewide recycling contracts with Republic Services, Rapid Shred, Waste Management, or alternative service options provided by local providers. Although these options cover many areas in the state, recycling services are unavailable in some locations.

Recycling in leased spaces is not available through all lessors; however, the DTMB Real Estate Division has implemented a process for requesting recycling services in leased spaces during the request for proposals (RFP) process and when negotiating lease renewals. Recycling language has been added to the RFP template and the space available proposal (SAP) template.

Rubbish removal services are contracted in many state facilities by Harland's Sanitary, Republic Services, or Waste Management. Locations not covered by these contracts are using local rubbish removal services, where available.

Recycling and Waste Measurement Pilot Program

The rubbish removal contractors available to state facilities are not capable of weighing or reporting trash weights. In addition, recycling weights are unavailable to state facilities outside of the Rapid Shred service area, which accounts for more than half the state's facilities.

DTMB will pilot a recycling and waste measurement program once substantial re-occupancy in state facilities is achieved. Scales were purchased to weigh solid waste and recycling materials onsite. DTMB will provide an analysis of the pilot program and will report on the costs, planning requirements, benefits and barriers.

State Employee Engagement

In response to Governor Whitmer's directive to engage employees, DTMB partnered with state agencies to create the Preserve Our Peninsulas employee campaign to boost recycling awareness and education through the following efforts:

- Monthly tips on how state employees can make a difference. *
- Message from the governor.
- Interactive Preserve Our Peninsulas website.
- Engagement activities. *
- Metric reporting (when available).

* Will resume with substantial re-occupancy of state facilities

 - Percentage of nonexempt facilities participating in the recycling program
 - Percent change of facilities participating in the recycling program from January 2020 to December 2020

Once state facilities are substantially reoccupied, the following pilot programs will begin and collect the pertinent data listed below:

- DTMB recycling and waste measurement pilot program results:
 - Total weights recycled by month
 - Total weights of waste by month
 - Recycling vs. waste percentage by month

- Composting pilot results:
 - Name of facility
 - Composting weights by month

Improvements and Expansion

DTMB and EGLE meet quarterly to discuss recycling progress and share ideas for advancement.

DTMB will meet semi-annually with state agency recycling liaisons to evaluate efforts and discuss improvement and expansion opportunities.

The following initial expansion opportunities identified by these partnerships include:

- Provide more education to state employees regarding proper recycling.
- Make recycling labels that are more easily identifiable and educational.
- Highlight the inclusion of batteries in the recycling program.
- Investigate composting opportunities.
- Consider hygiene needs in determining recycling locations.

The annual report will include expansion opportunities collected throughout 2020, as well as initiatives and steps taken to implement recommendations.
